

## POST-OPERATIVE INSTRUCTIONS FOR HAND / UPPER EXTREMITY SURGERY

## Instructions Following Anesthesia or Sedation

The medicine that you received today is strong. It will affect your body for at least the next few hours. You may have trouble with coordination or thinking because of this medicine. Your nurse will go over these instructions with you, but please read them over when you get home and again in the morning. For your safety, follow these recommendations carefully for the next 24 hours:

- . Do not drive at all. You must be taken home today by a responsible adult.
- Do not drink alcoholic beverages.
   Do not smoke.
   You should rest today. Do not go to work.
- · You should not do things that require you to think and act quickly. Avoid cooking and operating machinery or electrical appliances. Get help today with child or elder care.
- · You should not make important decisions or sign legal papers today.
- The medicine may make you feel sleepy or sick to your stomach or you may have a poor appetite. If these problems are severe or if they last a long time, call your doctor.

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Failt and Frescription Medicines					
We will give you an updated list of your current medicines before you go home, with instructions on what					
medicines to take or stop taking when you go home. Please refer to this list.

Your last dose of pain medicine was: You may take another dose at, if needed					
<ul> <li>In addition to any pain medicine that your doctor has prescribed:</li> </ul>					
☐ You may take Tylenol <sup>®</sup> (acetaminophen). Do not take more than 4000 mg in 24 hours.					
Please note that some narcotic medicines may contain Tylenol® (acetaminophen).					
These include medicines like Percocet <sup>®</sup> , Tylenol #3 <sup>®</sup> , and Vicodin <sup>®</sup> .					
☐ You may take Motrin <sup>®</sup> , ibuprofen or similar medicine ☐ today ☐ in 24 hours ☐ in 48 hours					
□ Do not take Motrin <sup>®</sup> , ibuprofen or similar medicine.					
<ul> <li>Do not drive while you are taking "narcotic" pain medicine.</li> </ul>					
<ul> <li>If you are not having pain, stop taking the pain medicine.</li> </ul>					
<ul> <li>Nausea, dizziness and drowsiness are normal side effects of prescribed pain medicine. If you have these</li> </ul>					
symptoms and cannot tolerate them, stop taking the pain medicine.					
<ul> <li>Some pain medicines can cause constipation. If this happens, you may take a stool softener (such as</li> </ul>					
Colace®), or a gentle laxative (such as Milk of Magnesia). You do not need a prescription for these.					
<ul> <li>You may apply ice for the first 48 hours after surgery.</li> </ul>					
You have received a prescription for an antibiotic. Take it as directed.					
Surgical Dressing					
□ Keep your dressing clean and dry until your follow-up appointment.					
☐ If there is blood and drainage on your dressing, wrap over it with clean gauze or an ace bandage.					
☐ You can remove the dressing days after surgery.					
☐ Other instructions about your dressing:					
Stitches and General Care					
Stitches will be removed 10 to 15 days after surgery.					
Keep your hand raised at a level above your heart for 24 hours after surgery.					
☐ Keep your brace or splint on at all times.					
You may take off the sling after 48 hours if it is more comfortable for you.					



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
